COURSE DESCRIPTION (CONTINUED)

ADVANCED COMPOSITION will review paragraph organization and develop the skill of writing essays using selected rhetorical modes. This class emphasizes accurate use of advanced grammatical structures and includes summarizing, paraphrasing, and research writing.

You will be given the opportunity to demonstrate the following **COURSE OUTCOMES**:

- Compose well-organized, clearly focused, welldeveloped essays
- Utilize common rhetorical modes in the development of essays
- Compose grammatically correct simple, compound, and complex sentences

- Use outside sources in an ethical, clearly documented way

<u>CURIOSITY</u>: Good writing begins with curiosity. I encourage you to ask questions, express your views, try out new ideas, and make mistakes.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY: How to be a responsible and ethical writer is a major part of this course. You will learn strategies to avoid unintentional plagiarism in your writing. All essays will be submitted to a plagiarism checker in D2L.

Turning in the same assignment for more than one class is a form of academic dishonesty and may result in a grade of "F" for the assignment. If you would like to write on a topic you have previously written about, please speak with me before beginning your assignment.

PARTICIPATION: I believe that our classroom is a place where you can take control of your education. I urge you to actively engage with the course materials, your classmates, and myself.

SOCIAL JUSTICE: People all over the world suffer because of discrimination and inequality. I believe education plays a huge role in improving society. Together, we will explore topics that help raise our awareness of the world around us and improve our understanding of social problems.

PARTICIPATION: A large amount of work this semester will be done in class with me and your peers. I hope you actively participate in this class because I have found it is the best way to engage you in learning. You will receive a weekly participation grade in D2L.

In addition to attending class regularly, see page 9 in this syllabus for how to be an active participant.

INFORMAL ASSIGNMENTS: This category includes short homework assignments (such as reading responses and writing exercises), in-class activities, and initial drafts of essays.

I will give you detailed guidelines and grading rubrics for all informal assignments. The purpose of informal assignments is threefold:

- To get you thinking about the topics and ideas we are discussing so that you can develop informed opinions on them
- To give you the opportunity to practice the skills you need for each essay
- To reflect on your writing development after each formal essay

FINAL E-PORTFOLIO: The majority of your grade in this class will be determined by your final E-Portfolio.

Throughout the semester, your essays will go through multiple revisions as you share with me and your peers and get advice on revision. At the end of the semester, you will create an online portfolio that contains polished, revised versions of your work, marked up drafts and revisions, and a final Reflective Statement.

GRADES (CONTINUED)

We will write three essays this semester. For each essay, I will give you detailed assignment guidelines and grading rubrics.

At the end of the semester, you will compile all your essays in your E-Portfolio on D2L.

Keep every version (hard copy and electronic, including feedback) of your writing for the E-Portfolio. In order to get full credit, you must have all drafts for each essay.

Don't worry! We will go through each step of the portfolio together in class. I will help you with each part of this process.

On early drafts of essays, I will indicate whether your writing is not passing, passing, or above passing. As we progress through the semester, I will begin to put grades on drafts to give you an idea of how your drafts would do in the E-Portfolio.

However, no draft in this class is ever final until the Final E-Portfolio. You may continue to revise your drafts throughout the semester to improve your grade in the Final E-Portfolio.

ABSENCES AND LATE WORK

ABSENCES: Because our writing class is a community and many of our activities are collaborative, your attendance is incredibly important to your success in this class.

I urge you to attend every class. However, I understand that sometimes problems arise that may prevent you from attending. Please contact me as soon as you know you will be absent. This helps me adjust my plan for the other students and we can discuss make-up options.

If you miss a class, you will receive a participation score of 0 for that day.

But, I understand that sometimes emergencies and traumatic events happen. These situations are difficult, but if you contact me within 24 hours of the event and provide documentation, you will not lose participation points.

LATE WORK: Unless you contact me before the due date and we discuss an alternative, late work is eligible for 60% of points.
